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1. Course Description

This course explores the potential for transformation and empowerment within *adult learning environments*. In the first stage, the course reviews transformative learning theory, key perspectives on adult education and adult learning, and the educator's role in facilitating transformative learning. It then examines the awakening of critical consciousness and the development of networks of learning resources.

In the second stage, the course investigates how transformative learning occurs within learning communities across diverse settings, including arts-based programs, leadership development in higher education, adult basic education, workplace communication courses, and other specialized learning groups.

2. Course Purpose

The purpose of this course is to help students develop knowledge of adult learning and an understanding of how learners achieve changes in mindset and life empowerment through the learning process. In addition to studying best-practice cases in a global context, students will have the opportunity to demonstrate and analyze similar situations in their local communities, compare them with cases discussed in class, and explore possible solutions for future improvement. Through this process, students will acquire practical knowledge of transformative learning within a community context. Students are also encouraged to cultivate independent analytical and critical thinking skills from a leadership perspective, with a focus on resource management and educational planning in multicultural environments.

3. Assessment

10%: Participation (attendance, punctuality, class discussion).

30%: Weekly assignments based on readings: essays, discussion forum, and quizzes.

30%: Oral presentation.

30%: Term paper and pre-recorded presentation.

4. Assignments & Evaluation Criteria

A. Asynchronous classes (see Table 1):

Reflection essays, participation in discussion forum, and quizzes:

Each unit (except Unit 3) includes two reflection questions and one quiz. Students are required to complete the following tasks on CCU Ecourse2 by the designated due date:

- a. Submit a 200-word essay in response to one reflection question.
- b. Post a reflection in response to the other question and provide comment on other students' responses in the discussion forum.
- c. Complete the quiz.

Evaluation criteria (This component accounts for 30% of the course grade):

- a. Essay (50%):
 - I. Reflection (25%).
 - II. Critical analysis and development of extended questions (25%).
- b. Discussion forum (30%): Reflections & comments on peers' posts.
- c. Quiz completion (10%).
- d. Timeliness (10%).

B. Synchronous classes (see Table 2):

a. In addition to the first class on February 25 for course introduction, unit discussions will be arranged on **March 11** for Unit 4, **April 1** for Units 1 & 5, and **April 29** for Units 2 & 3. Students will be divided into three groups, with each group assigned one hour to discuss reflection questions with the instructor.

b. Beginning May 6, students are required to read the two assigned chapters each week, complete the quiz for each chapter before the class, and take turns giving oral presentations (one chapter per presenter).

After the weekly presentations, all students—except the presenter—are required to post comments on both presentations in the CCU Ecourse2 discussion forum. Presenters are expected to respond to their classmates' comments.

Presentations must be delivered using slides and should include:

- (a) Background information and a theoretical review.
- (b) Analysis of the case.
- (c) Comparisons with similar cases in the student's home region or elsewhere in the world.
- (d) Reflections and feedback.
- (e) Discussion questions or related learning activities.

Presentation slides must be uploaded to CCU Ecourse2 no later than the Sunday prior to the scheduled class. Each presenter will deliver a one-hour oral report, followed by a 30-minute discussion session or activities.

Evaluation criteria for presenters

(This component accounts for 30% of the course grade).

(a) Oral Presentation (70%):

- I. Case background and theoretical review (10%).
- II. Analysis and comparison (20%).
- III. Reflection and feedback (20%).
- IV. Discussion questions or facilitation of activities (10%).
- V. Content organization and presentation skills (10%).

(b) Discussion Forum (10%): Reflections and comments on peers' posts.

(c) Quiz Completion (10%).

(d) Timeliness (10%).

Evaluation criteria for non-presenters

(This component is calculated together with weekly assignments.)

(a) Discussion Forum (60%): Reflections and comments on peers' posts.

(b) Quiz Completion (20%).

(c) Timeliness (20%).

C. Term paper & pre-recorded presentation video:

The term paper must correspond to the topic of your oral presentation and should be expanded by incorporating comparable cases from other contexts or regions. The paper should include:

- (a) An introduction that provides relevant background information;
- (b) A review of relevant theories and literature;
- (c) An analysis and reflection on the selected cases, including discussion of extended issues; and
- (d) A conclusion proposing a model of best practice.

Ideally, the proposed best-practice model should be original, integrating key elements from different cases to represent an optimal approach. Alternatively, if you find that an existing model is superior to others and applicable across contexts, you may adopt that model and provide a clear and well-supported justification for your choice.

The paper must be well structured and formatted in APA style, with a maximum length of 4,000 words. It is due on June 24. In addition, students are required to submit a 40-minute pre-recorded presentation video accompanied by slides.

Evaluation Criteria for the Term Paper and Pre-Recorded Presentation Video

(This component accounts for 30% of the final course grade.)

(a) **Introduction and literature review (20%)**

(b) **Analysis and comparison of cases, with reflection (40%)**

(c) **Discussion of feedback and extended issues, and proposal of a best-practice model**

(30%)

(d) **Timeliness and adherence to required format** (10%)

5. Academic integrity

Academic misconduct, including plagiarism, may result in failure of the course and additional penalties. Students should avoid using others' words, ideas, or work without giving proper credit to the original author. **Any use of generative AI for assignments should be clearly specified in the text.** When working on weekly essays, presentations, and term papers, be sure to paraphrase, quote, and cite sources properly.
