Course description and specifications

Course description

This course introduces film production process, including the fundamental concepts of cinematography, editing, sound & music, script writing, directing, etc. it also covers cinema's genres, languages and narrative structures. After studying related concepts and watching the representative movies under each subject, the student should know how to analyze, appreciate, and study a film. And s/he shall have a solid base for advanced training in audiovisual production.

Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILO):

- CILO 1: The students will understand the divisions of film production and their required skills.
- CILO 2: The students will learn the fundamental film business elements.
- CILO 3: The students will know movie genres and appreciate the best movies of them.
- CILO 4: The students will do film criticism with their learned film theories.

Teaching and Learning Activities (TLAs)

- Lecture 50%
 - The lecturer elaborates the related disciplines, concepts, rules, theories, cases, and operational procedures.
- Seminar 25%
 - The students are divided into groups to study award-winning films under each subject. Each group will present their study outcome in-class in 30 mins for advanced learning and reflexive thinking.
- Tutorial 25%
 - The preparation for each group's presentation above will be completed step by step. The
 group shall follow the scheduled steps, meaning to complete all the study components
 respectively, and present their study outcome to the mentor, who gives further suggestions or
 directives for improvement, during tutorial session.

Final exam: 30%

- Attendance (5%)

This item is based on the individual's roll call record. Roll call will be done in the beginning of each session. A student will have 1 point if s/he enters classroom before the roll call finishes and 0.5 points after it. S/he shall have 0 due to absence. The sum of the points a student has in the semester represents his/her attendance marks. The student's absence record can be written off when s/he presents acceptable certificate for sick leave or compassionate leave.

- Participation (5%)

- The participation is based on the student's performance in and after class. The more a student delivers feedback to the teaching topics, including asking relevant questions and engaging in discussion, the more marks in this part s/he gets.
- Students are welcomed to have discussions with the lecturer during the office hours when they need further clarification of concepts presented in class, or assistance about the homework assigned. An appointment beforehand via email is necessary for the discussion.
 - Assessment criteria
 - Frequency 70%
 - Relevance 30%

- Seminar presentation (in group) 50%

- Each group has to choose two (at least) award-winning films for study under each subject. Based on the learning from textbook, they firstly collect and organize relevant film critiques, which provide strong reasons of the award. After that, the summarized points shall be mapped to clips of the chosen film properly for better elaboration.
- The study outcome shall be presented in PPT format in 30 mins in class.
- Assessment criteria
 - Performance in tutorial session 40%
 - Organization 40%
 - Presentation expression 10%
 - Reflexive thinking 10%

Final exam (40%)

- Remote exam via eCourse with limited time. You can refer to your notes and learning materials when answering.
- The exam guestions are based on the lecture and seminar materials.
